

In 2017 during the global day of celebration – "Giving Tuesday," the ELAC family launched its first ELAC Transforming Lives (TLC) Annual Giving Campaign to address significant challenges (homelessness, hunger/food insecurity, transportation, and clothing) facing ELAC students far beyond the cost of textbooks or tuition.

this has immense negative impacts on academic performance and degree. According to a 2017 survey commissioned by LACCD, 1 in every 5 of our students in the district is homeless, and according to a recent internal poll conducted by ELAC students, 70.3% of our students have experienced hunger/food insecurity on campus. One of the biggest challenges I've faced while being a student at ELAC is being homeless. As a full-time student it can sometimes interfere with your schoolwork. Being a full-time student, at times, I have to try and find where exactly am I going to sleep at night while also trying to maintain my schoolwork



The purpose of the TLC is to raise awareness of the immediate needs of many of our students and provide an opportunity for our campus community to help our students meet their needs through payroll giving and program support. There are many reasons our students lack fixed, regular, and adequate housing, including parental conflict, family separation, exiting foster care, neglect, or abuse. Most recently, the TLC campaign assisted students who were displaced due to domestic violence issues.

Unfortunately, student homelessness and basic needs insecurity have become a national crisis and

EAST LOS ANGELES COLLEGE'S FIRST FEMALE FOOTBALL PLAYER FEATURED IN SUPER BOWL COMMERCIAL

Ms. Toni Harris, the first female football player ever for the East Los Angeles College (ELAC) Huskies, was the featured star of a Toyota commercial that aired before an estimated 100 million television viewers during Super Bowl LIII on Sunday, February 3, 2019.

Ms. Harris was also featured in a four-minute-long news segment during a national network broadcast of CBS This Morning that highlighted her remarkable story and her role model status for future female football players. CBS carried the poignant interview with Ms. Harris and premiered the Toyota commercial. The broadcast and commercial are online at Bit.ly/ELACToniHarris.

Ms. Harris, No. 31, played defense as a Free Safety for the ELAC Huskies Football Team and has been an important part of the team's success, according to ELAC Head Football Coach Bobby Godinez. Ms. Harris is one of the few women ever to play full contact college football. She joined the ELAC Huskies team in June 2017 and has been playing football since she was about six years old in her hometown of Detroit, Michigan.

Ms. Harris was honored and recognized at the 2019 Annual ELAC Alumni Association Power Mixer and the 2019 ELAC 15th Annual President's Gala.

She is currently a safety for Central Methodist University in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. She is the first female to receive a full college football scholarship as a non-specialist, and the second woman to ever play football on scholarship.

Since its launch in April 2018, the ESTEC™LA Incubator has generated unprecedented recognition for its programming that included a two-day entrepreneurship workshop and eleven weeks of Small Business Management and Marketing workshops, including topics such as principles of selling, personal mentorship, accounting services, a legal roadmap, women/minority certification workshops, and also provided a dedicated cowork space for incubator participants—all free to the participants. The ESTEC™ LA Incubator has been featured by Univision, LA Business Journal, and was recognized in an incubator study by the University of Washington Foster School of Business in partnership with the Initiative for a Competitive Inner City (ICIC) as the only incubator in Los Angeles county "focused on entrepreneurs of color in inner city neighborhoods."

Today, the ESTEC™ LA Incubator is comprised of a cohort of 11 enterprises. The inaugural cohort is incredibly diverse both in owner demographics and current status in the development phase. While some cohort members are in the initial phase, others are scaling their business for growth.

It was a privilege to bring the Latino community leaders to meet the students and to share about the transformative impact these trailblazers have had on our society. We all either have roots in East LA, and many with ELAC, so it was important for us to show the students that they, too, can make a difference in their lives and their communities."

Power Shift charts the rise of Latino political power and its impact, from the breakthrough election of the first Mexican American to the Los Angeles City Council in 1949 to today's leadership of California and its heavyweight role in polarized America. This inspiring story recounts the origins and development of ten LA-based Latino and Latina leaders who transformed politics and government, forging a progressive political tradition in the process. Seven of those leaders joined authors Pla and Ayón on stage to discuss their stories with ELAC students.

Hundreds of ELAC students, staff, and faculty attended the event to hear from historic leaders who are rooted in East LA and whose influence spans the state and the country. Moderated by Dr. Marcel Morales, Department Chair of Social Sciences, the panelists were asked questions prepared by ELAC students.
